ACTIONS

- Sherman's command consisted of portions of Hildebrand's and Buckland's brigades. They advance on the position of the Confederate hospital camp.
- 2 Forrest charges through the Union skirmish line and supporting cavalry with approx. 300 troopers, consisting of Texans, Mississippians and Tennesseans.
- Forrest and his men are fired upon by Union infantry. Forrest is gravely wounded and the Confederates retire.
- Sherman captures the hospital camp, sends the cavalry to scout ahead, but decides against any further pursuit, ending the Battle of Shiloh
